ABC`s of a Good Petition Campaign

A. Sign the Petition and Get Others to Sign

The best way to get a petition signed is to do it systematically.

Ideally, you can organise a meeting with the tenants of your building to explain the situation (see the above text) and ask the people present to sign the petition. Afterwards, you can make a visit to each of the apartments in your building.

For the Tenant's Associations that include several different buildings, you can identify someone responsible for each building who will do a door-to-door visit.

Everyone can sign the petition, including people who do not live in Low-Cost Housing. You can ask your friends and family to sign. If you participate in other groups (seniors groups, bowling clubs, collective kitchens, etc.) don't hesitate to bring the petition with you and ask the other members to sign.

The tenants who sit on the Board of Directors can ask the other members of the Board of Directors to sign the petition. As well, the Board of your Municipal Housing Office can vote a model resolution to support the petition.

Employees at the office can also sign the petition.

B. Give Your Petition to Your Member of Parliament

The petition is designed to put pressure on the federal government. Each MP can, if his or her constituency demands, read the petition in the Chamber of Commons in Ottawa. In order to do this, you must give them the petition.

We invite you to ask for a meeting with your local MP in order to give them this petition and to ask them to do everything in their power, including reading the petition in the Chamber of Commons, in order to ensure that the renovation budget for Low-Cost Housing are not cut by the federal government.

A budget cut of 30% Please sign this petition!!

Dear fellow tenants,

We have just learned from *Société d'habitation du Quebec* President John MacKay that the 2011 budget for the renovation of Low-Cost Housing (HLM) units across the province will fall to 200 million dollars from 276 million dollars.

This means that in 2011 a cut of 30% will be imposed on all Municipal Housing Offices that administer over 500 housing units and that other cuts will follow for the smaller housing offices in 2012. These cuts also mean that important construction work will again be delayed.

In concrete terms, these cuts will affect thousands of tenants who will continue to live in apartments with bad windows, frayed linoleum, and washrooms and kitchens without ventilation or proper plumbing. It will also mean that several buildings will remain inaccessible for people using personal mobility devices such as wheelchairs and scooters and that, amongst other things, the housing offices will have to abandon its program to retrofit apartments so as to enable the occupants to install individual washing machines and dryers.

These cuts are due to the refusal of the Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation (CMHC) to finance these renovations. The CMHC should dedicate 140 million dollars of funding per year, however it now wants to limit its contribution to only 70 million dollars. That is why we need your help!

If each of the 400 Low-Cost Housing Tenant Association does its part, we will deposit a petition with tens of thousands of signatures to the 75 Quebecois Members of Parliament. This will be a strong lobbying tool in the run-up to the next federal budget as well as to the possible up-coming elections.

With your help, we will obtain the necessary money to renovate our homes!
